Purpose of this Event

- From Spring 2024 Derbyshire County Council is considering moving away from the current grantfunded 'Recovery Project' system towards a commissioned Recovery service.
- We have and are continuing to undertake an extensive co-production exercise with stakeholders, including those with lived-experience and wider system partners, to consider what a needs to be included as part of this service, and how this can be delivered.
- This event is part of this process to gather information to inform the design and development of a new service to build recovery communities and activities in Derbyshire for substance misuse, and ensure that it is available to all Derbyshire residents

Our Desired Outcomes of the Event



- > Provide people with lived experience, service providers, and interested individuals with the opportunity to influence the development of a local recovery initiative
- Sain a better understanding of what solutions, services and resources are available within the local and national market
- Explore how the options could be delivered that are in line with Derbyshire's unique geography
- Sauge the level of interest in the project prior to going to the market
- > Consider the costs; and
- > Determine the most effective way of delivering the service

What is Recovery?

- There is no one definition of recovery.
- Various definitions do share common elements.
- The CHIME (Connectedness; Hope and optimism about the future; Identity; Meaning in life; and Empowerment) model of recovery proposed by Leamy et al. (2017) includes processes that involve rebuilding a sense of identity, rebuilding one's life, and receiving peer support



Recovery Capital

- The processes involved in recovery can be identified through what's known as recovery capital (RC). These are the resources that individuals in recovery need, and gain throughout their recovery journey, including:
 - social (e.g., positive social networks)
 - community (e.g., support groups)
 - personal (e.g., resilience)

The purpose of any Recovery-focussed project or service is to support individuals in Recovery to develop the resources identified as part of Recovery Capital

Background: Recovery Grants



- At present, Derbyshire County Council provides small grants to local organisations to deliver a number of 'Recovery Projects' on our behalf.
- Since 2020, the Council has grant funded the 1st year of a number two year projects, with the second year funded through match funding sought by the delivering organisation.
- Eligibility caps of £1million annual turnover were also introduced in 2020 as a condition of grant funding to encourage and enable smaller, grassroots organisations to become involved.

Current Recovery Grant- Funded Organisations



- 2021-2023 Grant
 - Chesterfield FC Community Trust The A-Spire Right Project – opportunities to try different sports and activities to improve physical and mental wellbeing.
 - Derventio Housing Growing Lives learning and wellbeing activities including horticulture, furniture up-cycling, arts and crafts, creative writing, relaxation and wellbeing, and cooking and healthy eating
 - Zink Employability The RISE project provide employment coaching and offer opportunities to access work experience and employment.

Current Recovery Grant- Funded Organisations



- 2022-2024 Grant
 - Helping Hooves CIC Carrot Club Wild Project focus on meaningful activity and connecting to nature.
 - Derbyshire Alcohol Advice Service (DAAS) STAND TO Project (Veterans) – deliver a range of physical activities and support groups
 - Padley Group County Kitchen combine skills towards budgeting, self awareness and independent living
 - Go Wild in Wirksworth The Countryside Kitchen focus on connecting to the environment, cooking and undertaking meaningful activities
 - The Brook Community Church and Centre Recovery Plus Specialist Worker – Group and 1to1 group work around the themes of addiction / recovery / mental health



Recovery Grants: Future

- The application window for the next lot of Recovery Grants closed on 17th November 2022 and we are in the process of reviewing and scoring these at present.
- These Grants will only run for one year from March 2023, and are due to end in Spring 2024.



'Recovery Month' Grants


- Since 2014 Derbyshire County Council has provided very small grants to local organisations to host events to celebrate 'Recovery Month' in September.
- In September 2022 over 100 people attended a variety of events to celebrate Recovery Month in Derbyshire, including attending a Recovery Football Festival at St George's Park and a Recovery Walk amongst others.

 the process of assessing needs, planning and prioritising, purchasing and monitoring health services, to get the best health outcomes



 a way of working, where everybody works together on an equal basis to create a service or come to a decision which works for them all

Some things to think about...

- Co-produced at every stage in its life
- Could include coaching, advocacy, socially-based services and drop-in type help
- Informed and responsive to the needs of minority groups (e.g. BAME)
- 'Stitched in' to treatment services to help people to access recovery and treatment support at the same time
- Could be co-located with treatment services
- Provides training and development opportunities for people in recovery
- Has an open door approach with no limits on access to support
- Embraces and enables multiple ways to recovery (e.g. not just 12 step)
- Accessible across the county area
